### QUOTA EXCHANGE

The market-clearing price established for the January, 2011 Quota Exchange was **\$26,380.00**. The results of the Quota Exchange are outlined in the following Table.

The next Quota Exchange will be held on February 15, 2011. All offers to sell and bids to purchase quota through the Quota Exchange must be received at the SMMB office by midnight, February 6, 2011. The SMMB recommends that offers and bids be submitted well in advance of the deadline date to ensure adequate time for corrections, if necessary.

Just a reminder to producers that when making bids on the Quota Exchange, the price on offers to sell quota is the minimum price that the producer is prepared to accept for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or greater than the producer's minimum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. Conversely, the price on offers to purchase quota is the maximum price that the producer is prepared to pay for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or less than the producer's maximum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange.

The clearing price is set at the price where the smallest difference exists between the accumulated volume offered for sale and the accumulated volume bid to purchase.

Producers are not allowed to accumulate negative production credits (kgs of butterfat) in excess of -20 days. **LOST OPPORTUNITY** occurs when a producer's negative production credits exceed -20 days. For every kg of butterfat that becomes lost opportunity, producers have lost approximately \$20/kg in gross revenue potential. In December, 20 producers had 6,612.44 kgs of lost opportunity, which resulted in lost gross revenue potential of approximately \$132,248 or, on average, \$6,612 per producer for those 20 producers.

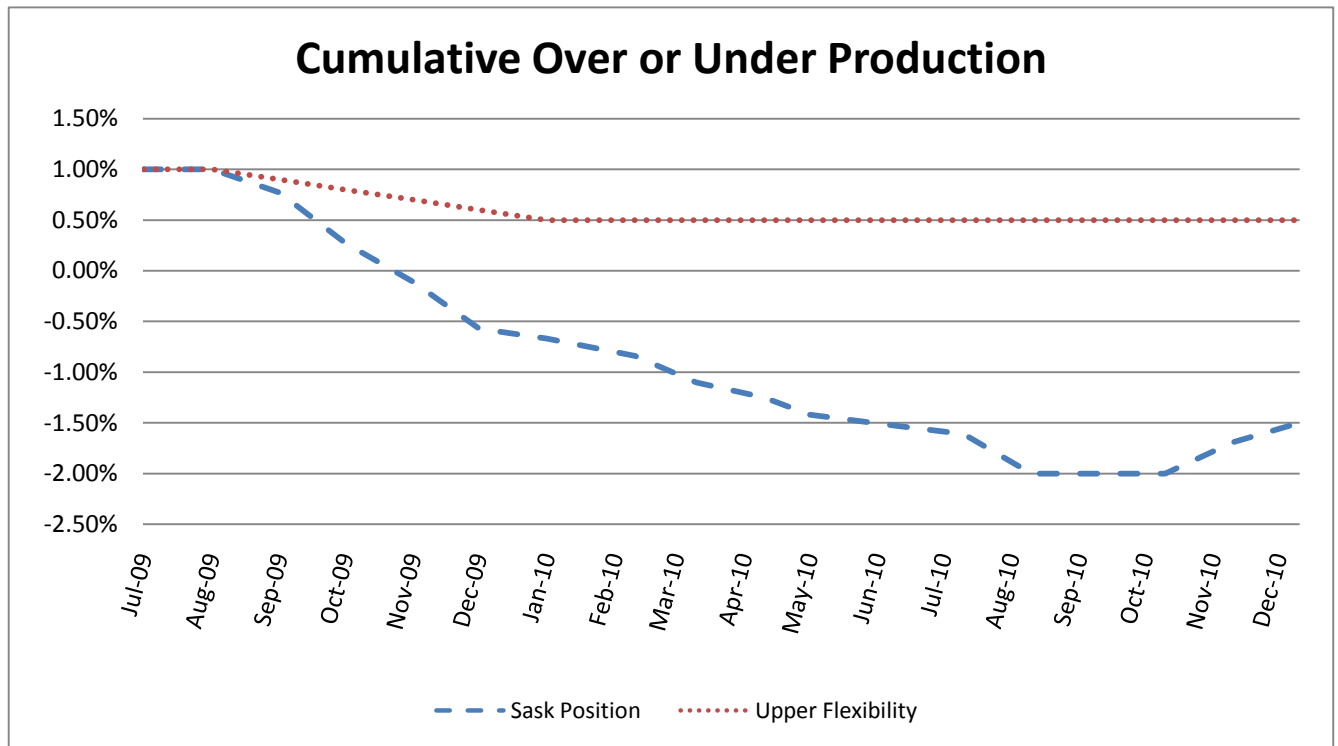

In December, Saskatchewan had a monthly CDC allocation of **785,901 kilograms** of butterfat. In the month of December, Saskatchewan production was **-54,781 kilograms** of butterfat **under** and cumulatively **under** by **-130,400 kilograms** of butterfat. On a percentage basis, Saskatchewan is at **-1.50%** within our CDC allocation flexibility limits based on the Continuous Quota model. The -1.50% lower limit is in effect.

## MASTITIS FLASH

### Why Teat Condition is Important?

In recent years, considerable attention has focused on teat condition and health. Why? Because there is a correlation between increased teat-end hyperkeratosis and increased risk of new mastitis infections. Measuring teat condition gives an indication of the stresses applied during milking and the resulting tissue congestion. Teat condition assessment can also give some indication of the comfort level of cows during milking, especially at the low flow period at the end of milking.

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Questions most frequently asked by producers.

***What is the maximum amount of transfer credits that I can transfer out in a 12 month period?***

**Effective September, 2010, to March, 2011 the 15% transfer out credit limit in a rolling 12 month period has been suspended.** There is no limit on the percent of transfer credits that can be transferred out over the next three months; however, the restrictions on the amount that can be transferred out on a monthly basis still apply. (REFER TO THE NEXT QUESTION)

***What is the maximum amount of transfer credits that I can transfer out in a month?***

The maximum transfer credits a producer can transfer out in a month are equal to what the producer's cumulative under position was in the previous month. You can only transfer out to a cumulative position of zero credits.

***What is the maximum amount of transfer credits that I can transfer in?***

There is no limit to the amount of credits that can be transferred in within a rolling 12 month period. The only limit when transferring in credits would be to not drop below the -30 credit day limit (**-20 credit days effective the end of November**) at the end of each month or you will have lost the opportunity to carry-forward those credits to produce that milk in the future.

***What is the deadline for transfer credits?***

The transfer credit deadline for any month is by midnight of the 20<sup>th</sup>. For example any transfer credit forms in the Board Office on or before midnight of January 20<sup>th</sup> will be effective January 1<sup>st</sup>.
