Food Bank Milk Donation!

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SaskMilk, on behalf of Saskatchewan's dairy farmers, made generous donations to both the Regina and Saskatoon Food Banks this summer to provide milk to children. Summer was the ideal time to make the donation, as many children in the community rely on school programs to receive milk, leading to a decline in consumption during the summer months – and we know how important milk is for children's nutrition!

The Regina Food Bank doesn't have an ongoing milk program, and so for them it means 1500 families will receive milk that otherwise wouldn't have; for Saskatoon, it means thousands of children receiving double the milk they would normally receive in the summer. Over 15,000 litres of milk is being provided, and it is being distributed over several weeks at both Food Banks in order to reach as many families as possible.

My Canadian Milk

DFC has launched *My Canadian Milk* to encourage Canadians to show their pride in, and advocate on behalf of, milk produced by and for Canadians. A new logo and website represent a fresh take on the *Canadian Milk Matters* initiative, originally launched in 2016 during the final stages of the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) negotiations.



My Canadian Milk provides Canadians with information on a number of pressing issues that will impact Canada's dairy sector—including the upcoming re-negotiation of the North America Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) between the United States, Mexico and Canada. The talks are scheduled to begin in mid-August. Although not directly referenced in their official priorities for the re-negotiations, released in July, it is expected that the US will seek increased access to Canada's dairy market at the expense of Canadian dairy farmers and the safe, high-quality milk they produce. However, representatives of the Canadian government, including the Prime Minister, Ministers of Agriculture, Foreign Affairs, and Finance, as well as the Canadian Ambassador to the US have all been publicly supportive of supply management and dairy.

<u>MyCanadianMilk.ca</u> provides Canadians with a rallying point around which to mobilize in support of Canadian dairy. The advocacy initiative also addresses other issues impacting Canada's dairy sector. These include Health Canada's on-going *Food Guide* consultations, the proposed Front-of-Pack Labelling and Healthy Eating Strategy.

Take a stand on behalf of Canadian milk—add your name to the growing number of Canadians who support *My Canadian Milk*.

Reminder!

The deadline date for Quota Transfer, Quota Exchange, Lease Applications, and 10% Transfer Limit Exemptions is the 6th of each month

Your Quota Transfer, Lease, and 10% Exemption Applications must be received on or before the 6th of the month in order to be effective the 1st of the following month

Quota Exchange forms must be received in the SaskMilk office on or before the 6^{th} of the month for that month's Exchange

"Fuelling" Women Champions – the champions Fund

The Champions Fund is an extension of the "Fuelling" Women Champions movement created by Canada's dairy farmers to help empower and break down barriers for amateur female athletes. The fund is a resource to provide financial support needed in their pursuit of their athletic goals.

There will be 30 grants of \$5,000 handed out this year to deserving female athletes, teams, or organizations across Canada.

Among those applying is Shelby Newkirk, a 21 year old para swimmer who lives in Saskatoon with her younger brother Cole, mother Kathy-Jo and father Rex, Director of the Canadian Feed Research Centre and a professor at the University of Saskatchewan's College of Agriculture and Bio-resources. Though she has only been swimming for 5 years her accomplishments have been great, as she holds seven Canadian records and is ranked first in the world in the S7 para swimming category. "It is safe to say she is powered by milk. Both of my kids are athletes and we go buys gallons and gallons of milk each week!" says her father Rex. Shelby just finished competing at the 2017 Canada Summer Games in Winnipeg, earning four gold medals and two silver medals. She also had the honor of being named flag bearer for team Saskatchewan at the closing ceremonies! After her wins at the summer games there is only time for a short break before she's back at training again as Shelby will be competing in the World Championships.

proAction: Traceability and Animal Care Requirements

Effective Sept 1, 2017, validations will include the requirements of the Traceability and Animal Care components of proAction.

For Traceability, you must be addressing these requirement:

1. Premise ID

SaskMilk did a mass application to Saskatchewan Agriculture for PID numbers for all dairy farmers in the province. You should have received a letter from Saskatchewan Agriculture with your PID number as well as a wallet card. You should also have received your PID number as a laminated wall certificate from SaskMilk with a request that it be hung on the milk house wall.

Please contact Deb Haupstein at SaskMilk if you did not receive a laminated wall certificate.

2. NLID tags/CCIA tags

Animals born on your farm and destined for the dairy industry must be double identified with approved NLID tags.

Animals born on your farm and destined for the beef industry can be identified with a single RFID ear tag (yellow button tag)

All calves must be tagged within 7 days of birth or before they leave the farm of origin, whichever occurs first.

3. Animal Births

Animal births must be <u>recorded</u> within 7 days of birth or before the animal leaves the farm. Required information (page 8- Traceability Workbook- Birth Record):

- Animal's birth date
- Animal ID- 15 digit tag number
- Premise Identification number

Animal births must be <u>reported*</u> to the national traceability database within 45 days of birth or before the animal leaves the farm of origin.

4. Move Ins

Animal move-ins must be <u>recorded</u> within 7 days of the animal's arrival on the farm or before it leaves the farm, whichever comes first.

Required information (page 9- Traceability Workbook- Animal Move-In Record):

- Animal ID- 15 digit tag number
- Move-in date
- Premise ID number of the farm of arrival (your farm)
- Premise ID of the farm of departure
- Vehicle license plate number single unit license number or trailer license number

Animal move-ins must be <u>reported*</u> to the national traceability database within 7 days of the animal's arrival on the farm or before it leaves the farm, whichever comes first.

5. Animal Deaths/Export (Tag Retirement)

Animal deaths, where the animal is disposed of on farm, must be <u>recorded</u> within 7 days following the death of the animal.

Required information: (page 10- Traceability Workbook- On-Farm Animal Disposal Record)

- Date of death
- Animal ID- 15 digit tag number
- Premise ID of your farm.

Animal deaths must be <u>reported*</u> to the national traceability database within 7 days following the death of the animal.

Animals exported outside of the country- should be <u>recorded</u> and <u>reported*</u> within 7 days of export.

Required information: (page 11- Traceability Workbook- Animal Export Record):

- Date of export
- Animal ID- 15 digit tag number
- Premise ID of your farm
- Location to which the animal was exported
- Vehicle license plate number

6. Tag replacement/Tag lost

When an animal loses one of its NLID tags – a replacement tag can be ordered from NLID with the original number.

Animals born prior to Sept 1, 2017 and identified with herd management tags must be tagged with an official RFID tag (CCIA button tag) when they leave the farm.

At all times the effort should be made to retain the animals' original identity- if for example an animal is being shipped off farm but has lost its NLID button, a CCIA tag can be used but a record of the NLID tag number and the CCIA tag number should be cross referenced so that animal identity is not lost. This should be <u>recorded</u> and <u>reported*</u> within 7 days of retagging the animal or before its departure from the farm, whichever comes first.

Reporting* is done to the Canadian Livestock Tracking System (CLTS) <u>www.clia.livestockid.ca</u>

At this time reporting is not a mandatory requirement of the Traceability program however you are strongly encouraged to set up your account and report.

Recording is the act of keeping records on farm. This is a mandatory requirement and these records must be available at the time of validation.

For Animal Care, you must be addressing these requirements:

1. Standard Operating Procedures

- Shipping Cattle
- Colostrum Management & Calf Feeding
- Animal Health Practices (disbudding/dehorning, castration, supernumerary teat removal and branding)
- Euthanasia

2. Records

- Corrective Action Plan For Downer cows
- Tail docking log
 - Tail docking is not permitted- you should have a log of any cows with docked tails and the reason

TRACEABILITY - NLID TAGS

For farms that currently use herd management tags and want to switch over to using NLID tags here is some important information:

You can order tags by:

- 1. Online through your HAC web account

You do not need to be a Holstein Canada member in order to order tags but you will need to set up an account. There are a variety of tag options to choose from. Talk to the customer service representative to determine the tag that will best suit your farm.

Remember that effective Sept 2017 it will be a requirement that heifer calves are tagged using NLID tags.

Dairy Farm Investment Program

On August 1, 2017, Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Lawrence MacAulay announced \$250 million in assistance to dairy cow producers to support increased productivity and competitiveness.

Up to \$250,000 per licenced dairy farm is available under this five-year program. Projects must relate to improving productivity of milk production from cows in Canada, and will be reimbursed up to 50% of the projects eligible costs. Projects started after November 10, 2016 may be eligible. Example projects include: hiring of external expertise to assess dairy farm productivity; purchasing, shipping, and installing eligible equipment; training to operate eligible equipment; retrofits to current facilities. Only new equipment (not used) will be eligible. AAFC will begin accepting applications on August 22, 2017.

QUOTA EXCHANGE

The market-clearing price established for the August 2017 Quota Exchange was \$32,200.00.

The next Quota Exchange will be held on **September 15, 2017**. All offers to sell and bids to purchase quota through the Quota Exchange must be received at the SaskMilk office by midnight, **September 6, 2017**. SaskMilk recommends that offers and bids be submitted well in advance of the deadline date to ensure adequate time for corrections, if necessary.

When making bids on the Quota Exchange, the price on offers to sell quota is the minimum price that the producer is prepared to accept for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or greater than the producer's minimum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. Conversely, the price on offers to purchase quota is the maximum price that the producer is prepared to pay for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or less than the producer's maximum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. The clearing price is set at the price where the smallest difference exists between the accumulated volume offered for sale and the accumulated volume bid to purchase. The results of the Quota Exchange are outlined in the following Table.

6.0 Euthanasia

Dairy producers will occasionally face situations where an animal is unlikely to respond favorably to treatment and must be euthanized on farm. It is the responsibility of livestock owners to make the right decision regarding euthanasia.

Euthanasia is the humane termination of the life of an animal. The method used must be quick, cause minimal pain and distress, and must be performed correctly using acceptable industry practices. Refer to Appendix J - Euthanasia of Cattle, for further guidance.

The following are currently the only acceptable methods for on-farm euthanasia of cattle:

- free bullet (.22 caliber for calves, .22 magnum or high-powered rifle for mature heifers, cows and bulls)
- penetrating captive bolt followed by pithing, bleeding or cardiac puncture
- non-penetrating captive bolt followed by bleeding (not for adult cattle)
- injection with barbiturates and other drugs (administered by a licensed veterinarian).

REQUIREMENTS

An acceptable method for euthanizing cattle must be used.

The method to euthanize cattle must be quick and cause the least possible pain and distress.

RECOMMENDED BEST PRACTICES


a. ensure only trained individuals are involved in euthanizing an animal

b. discuss euthanasia options with their veterinarian.



Euthanasia of Cattle

Anatomical Landmarks



Proper positioning of the firearm or penetrating captive bolt is necessary to achieve the desired results. When euthanasia is performed by gunshot, the firearm should be held within a few inches of the intended target. Ricochet may be prevented if the barrel of the firearm is positioned perpendicular to the skull as shown in the diagram.

The frontal target area is high up on the head of the animal, NOT BETWEEN THE EYES. An X can be made on the animals head by drawing imaginary lines between the inside corner of the eye to the horn on the opposite side (or to the top of the opposite ear in an animal without horns). The shot is the placed slightly above the intersection of the X (approximately 2 cm or 1 inch). The firearm should be positioned so that the muzzle is perpendicular to the skull and the bullet will enter the front of the head and travel toward the tail of the animal. There may be some differences in location of the shot based on the skull shape and horn mass of an animal.

INHIBITOR TEST STATIONS

The test stations have the Charm Trio test strips available for testing.
