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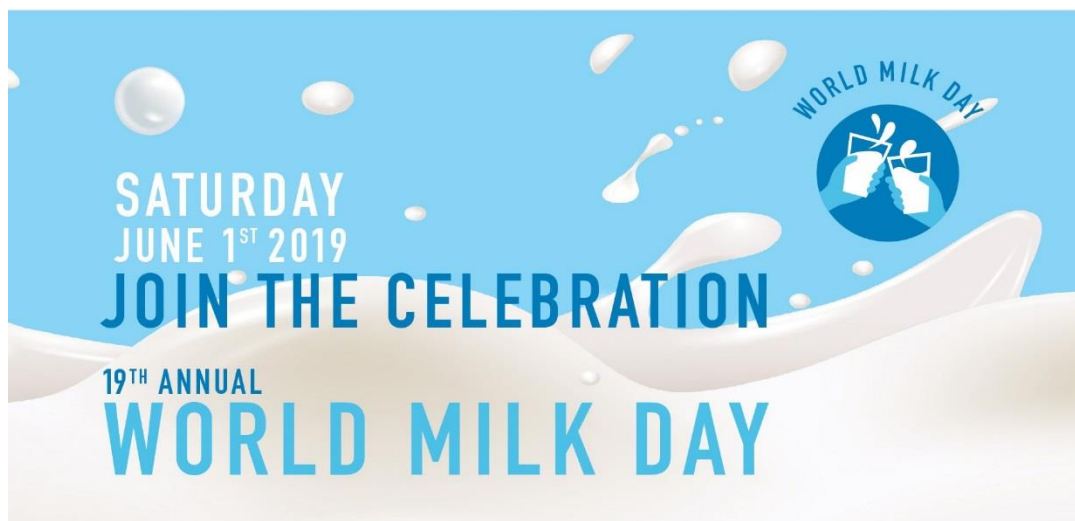
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World Milk Day

Canada's Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Dairy Cattle to be Updated

Canadian dairy farmers have always been committed to providing excellent care for their cattle. For this reason, Dairy Farmers of Canada initiated, in January of 2019, a regular update to the 2009 Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Dairy Cattle. The update will be guided by the National Farm Animal Care Council (NFACC).

Canada's Codes of Practice are valuable mechanisms within the industry because they set the guidelines for the care and handling of farm animals. They reflect our national understanding of animal care requirements, current science, and recommended practices, and serve as educational tools, as reference materials for regulations, and as the foundation for farm animal care assessment programs.

The update process includes both a Scientific Committee and a Code Development Committee. The Scientific Committee reviews current science on priority animal welfare issues and the resulting report provides valuable information to the Code Development Committee. As the Scientific Committee's report will be made public, the transparency and credibility of the Code process and the recommendations within are enhanced.

In April 2019, a survey was conducted as part of the Code development process. The survey attempted to capture top-of-mind welfare topics from all stakeholders, including farmers. The input received will help the Code Development Committee understand the top elements of animal welfare people wish to see considered in the update. The development process can take two to three years from start to finish.

Once the Code Development Committee has a draft, it is posted for a 60-day public comment period. The Code Development Committee considers the feedback and works on the final version of the Code. This final version will be submitted to NFACC, published by DFC and NFACC, and the dairy sector will take on the implementation process. This is anticipated for the fall of 2021.

"We are looking forward to updating our Code of Practice to reflect the most recent science and best farm practices. Farmers continue to demonstrate their commitment for animal care through proAction®, our quality assurance program," says Pierre Lampron, President of Dairy Farmers of Canada.

Code of Practice

3.4 Veterinary Care and Herd Health Management Programs

Animal health is an integral component of animal welfare. Producers should maintain the health of their animals through appropriate nutrition, appropriate housing, disease prevention, detection, and treatment. Veterinarians should play a key role in helping producers to meet these animal health obligations.

A Veterinarian/Client/Patient Relationship (VCPR) (35) exists when all of the following conditions have been met:

- the veterinarian has assumed the responsibility for making clinical judgments regarding the health of the animal(s) and the need for medical treatment, and the client has agreed to follow the veterinarian's instructions
- the veterinarian has sufficient knowledge of the animal(s) to initiate at least a general or preliminary diagnosis of the medical condition of the animal(s). This means that the veterinarian has recently seen and is personally acquainted with the keeping and care of the animal(s) by virtue of an examination of the animal(s) or by medically appropriate and timely visits to the premises where the animal(s) are kept
- the veterinarian is readily available for follow-up evaluation, or has arranged for emergency coverage, in the event of adverse reactions or failure of the treatment regimen.

An effective Herd Health Management Program contributes to animal wellbeing by providing a strategy for disease prevention, rapid diagnosis and effective treatment.

REQUIREMENTS

Producers must establish a working relationship with a practicing veterinarian (VCPR).

RECOMMENDED BEST PRACTICES

- a. work with the herd veterinarian to develop a Herd Health Management and Biosecurity Program (refer to Appendix K - Resources for Further Information)
- b. have a Herd Health Management Program which includes the following components:
 - vaccination protocols
 - observation of all animals for injury or signs of disease
 - complete, accurate, and reliable record keeping
 - protocols for the prevention, detection, and treatment of disease or injury, including lameness
 - protocols for pest control

Steps for Secondary contact:

1. Open the email received from the portal with subject line 'Complete account setup' (if not in Inbox check junk folder)
2. Click hyperlink within the "please complete your account setup by clicking [here](#)" phrase
3. Put in your producer number, in the user name/producer number field
4. Enter in your email address
5. Create a user name (beginning with a letter)
6. Create a password meeting the requirements: at least one capital and lower case letter, one number, one special character/symbol (i.e.!,&,*), and is at least 6 characters in length.

QUOTA EXCHANGE

The market-clearing price established for the May 2019 Quota Exchange was **\$34,500.00**.

The next Quota Exchange will be held on **June 15, 2019**. All offers to sell and bids to purchase quota through the Quota Exchange must be received at the SaskMilk office by midnight, **June 6, 2019**. SaskMilk recommends that offers and bids be submitted well in advance of the deadline date to ensure adequate time for corrections, if necessary.

When making bids on the Quota Exchange, the price on offers to sell quota is the minimum price that the producer is prepared to accept for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or greater than the producer's minimum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. Conversely, the price on offers to purchase quota is the maximum price that the producer is prepared to pay for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or less than the producer's maximum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. The clearing price is set at the price where the smallest difference exists between the accumulated volume offered for sale and the accumulated volume bid to purchase. The results of the Quota Exchange are outlined in the following Table.

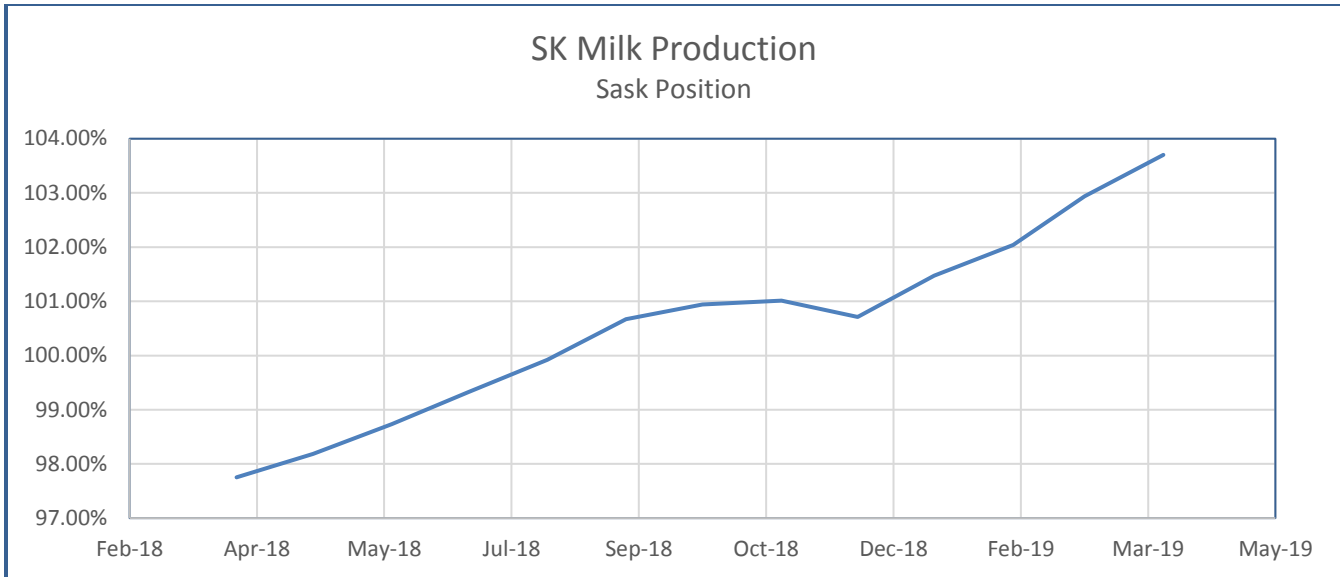

In April, Saskatchewan had a monthly CDC allocation of **896,852 kilograms** of butterfat. In the month of April, Saskatchewan production was **118,001** of butterfat **over** and cumulatively **over** by **201,170 kilograms** of butterfat. On a percentage basis, Saskatchewan is **1.73% above** our CDC allocation flexibility limits based on the Continuous Quota model. The -2.00% lower flexibility limit is in effect.

INHIBITOR TEST STATIONS

SaskMilk has established a number of inhibitor test stations around the province. Producers needing to check their bulk tanks for inhibitors can take a sample to the test station closest to their location.

The test stations have the Charm Trio test strips available for testing. The Charm Trio test is the test that the plant uses. It tests for the following drugs:

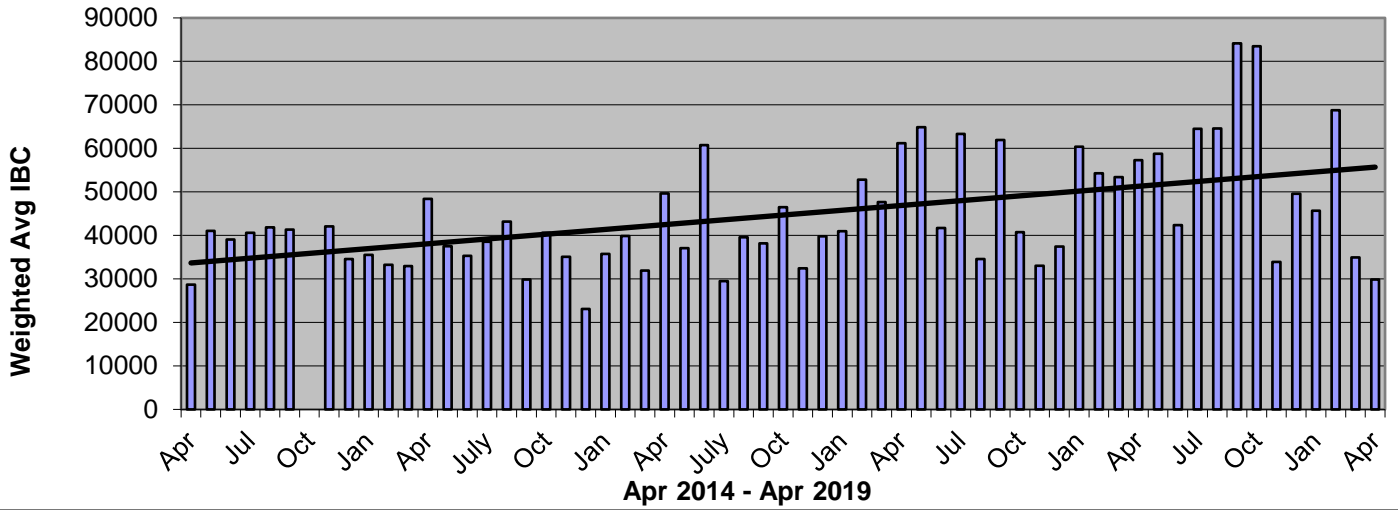

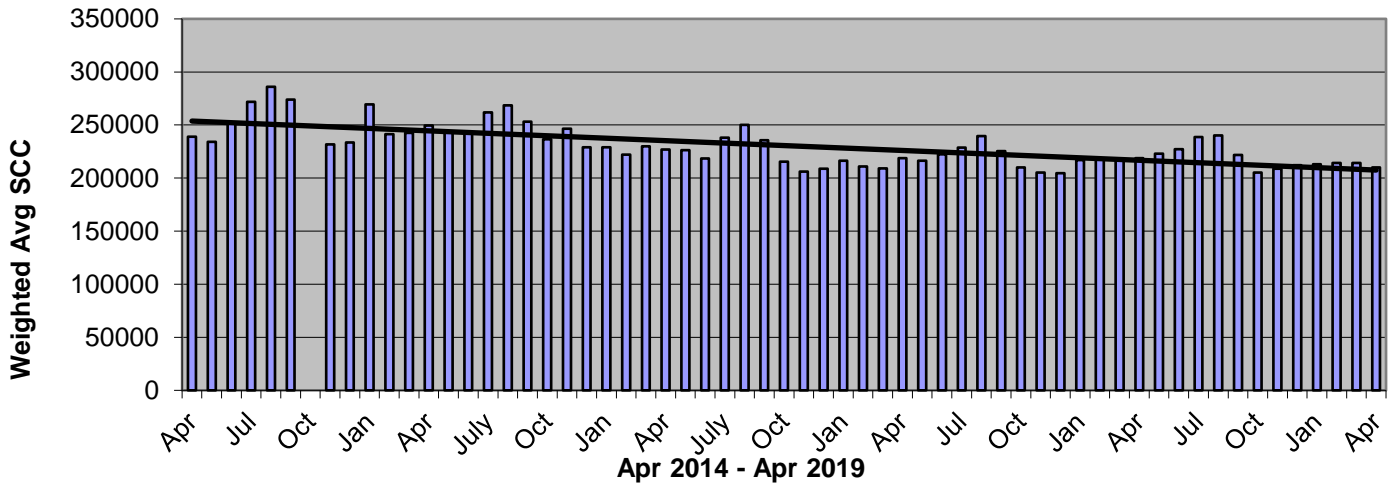

Provincial Weighted Average

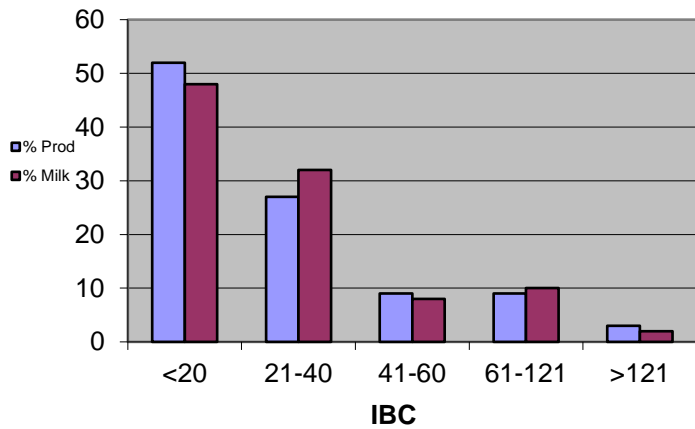
Monthly Weighted Average IBC



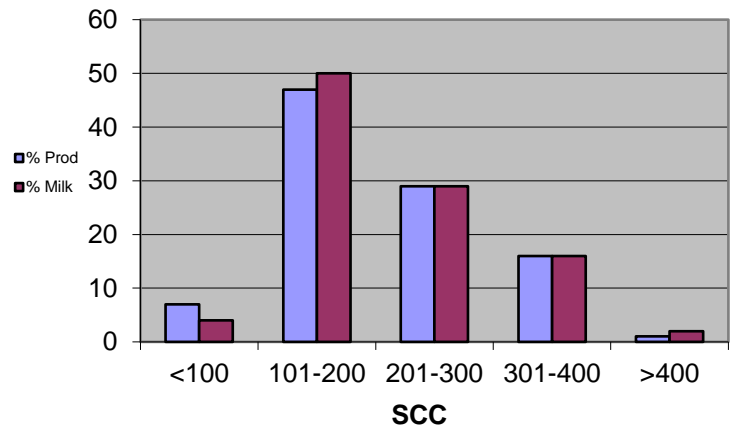

Dairy Info Day Regional Alfalfa Breeding Program

Alfalfa is one of the most important forage crops for the dairy producers in Saskatchewan. Having an alfalfa breeding operation in Saskatchewan would be beneficial for the dairy industry. Bill Biligetu covered this topic during his presentation, "Genetic Improvement of Alfalfa."

Many the alfalfa cultivars available in the market are developed outside Saskatchewan such as Northern United States. These alfalfa cultivars may not be well adapted to our climatic and soil conditions as they were selected under different growth conditions and management regimes. To maintain long-term completeness of the dairy industry, it is important to have a regional alfalfa breeding program in Saskatchewan to support industry need. In 2014, a new forage breeding program was established at the Crop Development Center of the University of Saskatchewan. This presentation provides photographic updates of the the program.

Bulk Tank Testing for *Salmonella Dublin* (*S.Dublin*) in Saskatchewan

SaskMilk in conjunction with the Ministry of Agriculture has developed a surveillance project for *S. Dublin* in Saskatchewan dairy herds. The first phase of the project is to test all bulk tanks for the presence of antibodies to *S. Dublin*.

Bulk tank testing will be done the week of May 13th. Results will be provided to producers the end of May.

The second phase of the project will be to test blood samples from 10 calves per herd. Calves should be between the ages four to eight months of age. Samples testing, shipping and material costs will be covered by the project. Veterinary costs will be the responsibility of the producers. This testing is not mandatory for producers but is encouraged. More information on how to proceed with the second phase will be provided in June.

Funding for this project is provided under the Federal Provincial Agricultural Partnership (CAP).
