The SaskMilk Quota Exchange is now live on the SaskMilk Portal! This exciting new capability allows producers to submit their own bids for the exchange online. Requirements for the Quota Exchange remain the same, including the deadline for postings to be submitted by the 6th of every month at midnight and with all required paperwork. DairyTrace Is Here!

The DairyTrace website went live Oct 5, 2020. A planned communication program has been happening over the last few weeks to introduce producers to DairyTrace and explain how get their DairyTrace accounts set up.

Week of Sept 28: Account activation letters were mailed to producers without email addresses. These letters provided a DairyTrace account number and passcode along with instructions to activate their account on the internet or via customer services.

Week of Oct 5: Pre-scheduled batched emails were set to producers. The emails provided producers with a direct link to the account login page at https://portal.dairytrace.ca/login using their DT account and temporary passcode.

Week of Oct 12: DairyTrace Welcome kits will be sent with the Milk Producers magazine to over 6,000 dairy producers across the country. The kit includes a "Farmer to Farmer" cover letter from the Lactanet Board Charis and Dairy Trace Advisory Committee Chair, a Program Guide, a new tag order form, a Dairy Trace Poster and an FAQ document.

From DFC

A message from Pierre Lampron, President of DFC

Dairy Farmers of Canada continues to pressure the federal government for an announcement on the schedule for the remaining seven years of compensation for concessions made under the Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) and the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership (CPTPP). DFC is also seeking details on the "full and fair" compensation promised by the federal government for the Canada-U.S.-Mexico Agreement (CUSMA).

When combined with Canada's obligations under the World Trade Organization, import concessions made by the government under these three agreements will see 18% of Canadian domestic dairy production transferred to dairy farmers in other countries by 2024.

Prime Minister Trudeau, Deputy Prime Minister Freeland and Agriculture Minister Bibeau have all acknowledged that dairy farmers deserve compensation for recent trade deals. The promise was reiterated once again in September's Speech from the Throne but beyond that, details have been scant.



The Speech from the Throne sent a message to dairy farmers that the government's commitment to compensate them for the losses they incurred from CETA, CPTPP, and more recently, CUSMA is still part of its deliverables. But, when every year, you lose \$450 million in domestic production being transferred to foreign dairy farmers, words aren't enough – only when we see details will we know if a promise made is a promise kept.

DFC is working with provincial milk associations to ask farmers to help deliver the message directly to their MPs. It is essential that local MPs be made aware of the federal government's commitments to compensate dairy producers for recent trade agreements and how important that compensation is to dairy farmers in terms of planning for the future.

We have prepared materials to help you discuss the subject of compensation with your MP either in person or in writing. You can download them from our DairyExpress+, app, available on the App Store and on Google Play.

Help us tell the government to honour its promises!

QUOTA EXCHANGE

The market-clearing price established for the October 2020 Quota Exchange was \$36,000.00.

The next Quota Exchange will be held on **November 15, 2020**. All offers to sell and bids to purchase quota through the Quota Exchange must be received at the SaskMilk office by midnight, **November 6, 2020**. SaskMilk recommends that offers and bids be submitted well in advance of the deadline date to ensure adequate time for corrections, if necessary.

When making bids on the Quota Exchange, the price on offers to sell quota is the minimum price that the producer is prepared to accept for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or greater than the producer's minimum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. Conversely, the price on offers to purchase quota is the maximum price that the producer is prepared to pay for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or less than the producer's maximum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. The clearing price is set at the price where the smallest difference exists between the accumulated volume offered for sale and the accumulated volume bid to purchase. The results of the Quota Exchange are outlined in the following Table.



In September, Saskatchewan had a monthly CDC allocation of **1,064,393 kilograms** of butterfat. In the month of September, Saskatchewan production was **-41,304 kgs** of butterfat **under** and cumulatively **over** by **598,279 kgs** of butterfat. On a percentage basis, Saskatchewan is **4.94% above** our CDC allocation flexibility limits based on the Continuous Quota model. The **-2.00%** lower flexibility limit is in effect.

INHIBITOR TEST STATIONS

SaskMilk has established a number of inhibitor test stations around the province. Producers needing to check their bulk tanks for inhibitors can take a sample to the test station closest to their location.

The test stations have the Charm Trio test strips available for testing. The Charm Trio test is the test that the plant uses. It tests for the following drugs:

Code of Practice

4.10 Udder Hair Removal

Long udder hairs trap and accumulate dirt and manure. This increases difficulty, time and labor for sanitizing teats and prepping for milking. The risk of off-flavor milk is greater in herds that do not clip udders (72). Excessive hair affects the cleaning ability of automated (robotic) milkers. Clipping udders has not been found to increase the incidence of intramammary infections, reduce total milk bacterial counts, or counts of environmental organisms (75).

Producers use electric clippers to remove hair from udders; however, clipping is time consuming and hazardous. An alternative is flame-clipping or singeing. The technique uses a cool flame and quick pass under the udder to singe the hair off. Improper use of equipment or technique may burn teat ends.

RECOMMENDED BEST PRACTICES

- a. remove hair from udders on a regular schedule
- b. use clippers with sharp blades or flame-clip with a cool flame
- c. ensure animals are properly restrained
- d. train workers or employ competent individuals for the task.
