Canadian Western Agribition 2023 - Tina Leverton

Agribition was a resounding success this year at the Dairy Demo! The SaskMilk Dairy Demo is very well supported by students and teachers. Being one of the major draws for the Registered Programing portion of Agribition, it fills up very quickly.

The first 3 milking demos of the day (Mon-Fri) are all for registered participants. There is space for 270 kids in the bleachers and we were often overflowing onto the cement and the sides with more kids, parents, teachers and chaperones. There were lots of great questions. Our presentation usually focuses on how a cow makes milk (nutrition, body mechanics), how she gets milked and a little on the dairy industry (shipping milk, processing, blue cow & proAction).

The last milking demo of the day (Mon-Fri) and all the demos on Saturday are for the general public and were always well attended. These demos usually have smaller attendance, but the questions are often really good and the attendees are attentive.

Overall, there were approximately 4,700 people that took in a milking demo during Agribition and countless folks that stopped by in between demos. We had Gert from the U of S available to learn to milk a cow – a very popular feature! People of all ages stopped by to 'milk' a cow and take a selfie with Gert. We also had a video loop playing all day, showcasing different dairy farms and farmers from across Saskatchewan.

Mental Health Spotlight





Wet shoes, cold hands, fogged-up glasses, freezing temperatures, wind chills and dark days. You may find as the temperature drops with shortened days during the winter, so does our mood.

Canadian winters are tough and can bring extra challenges for farmers and those living in rural areas. Isolation and dark days, working outside and losing animals in extreme freezing temperatures, hazardous road conditions, equipment not working or starting are only a few challenges that winter brings on the farm.

If you're starting to feel like nothing but a very full and strong pot of coffee will get you out of bed, you aren't alone. According to the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA), between two and five per cent of the population have serious seasonal affective disorder (SAD), up to 15 per cent have milder, diagnosable forms of the disorder and up to 35 per cent of people are affected by the winter blues.

What is the difference between winter blues and SAD?

CMHA refers to the winter blues as "a wave of low emotions that come with these cold, dark days." You may find yourself feeling more lethargic and down overall. Although you may feel more gloomy than usual, the winter blues typically don't hinder your ability to enjoy life.

But if your winter blues start spreading to all aspects of your life — from the farm to relationships — you may be facing SAD. SAD is a recurrent type of depression associated with the change in seasons. Symptoms of SAD include sleep disturbances, lack of motivation, and withdrawal from social situations.

Here are 5 strategies that other farmers have shared on social media that have helped them beat the winter blues.

Getting outside: Being outdoors, breathing in fresh air, and taking in the sun's rays can be a mood booster.

Exercising: Moving the body can help lift the spirits, help you sleep better and feel good physically.

Running. Good for the body, good for the mind, good for the soul. @willpenrievans

Setting goals and organizing: Setting goals to track progress can help keep you motivated. Reducing clutter and organizing can help reduce stress.

Keep a list of projects/tasks you want to accomplish over the winter and then keep a timeline for doing them to avoid procrastination.

Planning a trip or vacation and taking a break

Taking on a new project or hobby

Other mentions included in the social media thread were practicing gratitude, reading, light therapy, having a daily routine, listening to music, dancing, taking vitamins, and connecting with others. When you are dealing with the winter blues, finding a way to safely spend time with supportive people can help. This may include walks outdoors, talking on the phone, or virtual coffee dates.

Quota Exchange

The market-clearing price established for the December 2023 Quota Exchange was \$39,000.00.

The next Quota Exchange will be held on January 15, 2024. All offers to sell and bids to purchase quota through the Quota Exchange must be submitted by midnight, January 6, 2024. SaskMilk recommends that offers and bids be submitted well in advance of the deadline date to ensure adequate time for corections, if necessary.

When making bids on the Quota Exchange, the price on offers to sell quota is the minimum price that the producer is prepared to accept for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or greater than the producer's minimum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. Conversely, the price on offers to purchase quota is the maximum price that the producer is prepared to pay for that quota. Only if the market-clearing price is equal to or less than the producer's maximum price will that producer qualify for participation in the Exchange. The clearing price is set at the price where the smallest difference exists between the accumulated volume offered for sale and the accumulated volume bid to purchase. The results of the Quota Exchange are outlined in the following table.

From my family to yours, I wish you a wonderful holiday season and a happy new year.




In November, Saskatchewan had a monthly CDC allocation of 1,101,219 **kilograms** of butterfat. Saskatchewan production was 50,189of butterfat under and cumulatively over by 1,051,969 kgs of butterfat. On a percentage basis, Saskatchewan is 8.48% above our CDC allocation flexibility limits based on the Continuous Quota model. The -2.00% lower flexibility limit is in effect.


